   had a narrow scope this time about river cleanup only.
25
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Janet, before we get into the MS. HARRISON: 1 discussion of the proposals, just a point of order. 2 Gosh, 10 years ago, when this fund got started, we did 3 adopt governing rules. Telephonic participation is appropriate for 5 establishing a quorum. But if you will recall, those 6 who are participating telephonically are not allowed to vote. So. 8 Oh, really? MS. PHILLIPS: 9 MS. HARRISON: Yeah. And I think that the 10 rationale for that was that they would not have the full 11 benefit of the -- of any kind of visual presentations 12 that were made by the presenters. 13 You know, if we want to revisit those rules at 14 some point in time, we certainly can. But as of now, 15 the governing rules say we want, you know, we want --16 they want them to provide comments, and so on. 17 But as far as the actual vote on the proposals, 18 it's the majority of the fund advisors who are actually 19 present that will carry the motion. 20 MS. PHILLIPS: Can we conduct business? 21 Oh, yeah, absolutely. Yeah. MS. HARRISON: 22 Yeah. 23 All right. MS. PHILLIPS: 24 MS. TURNER: Because the quorum is established 25

1	by those on the phone.
2	MS. PHILLIPS: Okay. So you guys on the phone
3	can ask questions and comment but not vote.
4	MS. HARRISON: Correct.
5	MS. PHILLIPS: Okay. Thank you for that point
6	of clarification.
7	So we have two proposals. And one of them is
8	from the City of Reno for 104,000. The other is Keep
9	Truckee Meadows Beautiful for 90,000. And just by way
10	of observing coincidence, that adds up to how much money
11	we have available.
12	MS. LYNN: I noticed that.
13	MS. PHILLIPS: We have both presenters here.
14	And so does anybody have any questions? We didn't have
15	our usual presubmittal questions this time.
16	Yeah, Sue.
17	MS. LYNN: For those two entities that proposed
18	these, well, proposed the proposals, did you all talk to
19	each other before formulating your proposals, and is
20	there already a coordination in place that isn't readily
21	apparent by the submittal of two different proposals?
22	MS. CAKIROGLU: Yes.
23	MR. MANN: Yes. We had a joint meeting.
24	MS. LYNN: Great.
25	MR. MANN: So KTMB is the planning effort, and

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we're getting started with boots on the ground.

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MS. PHILLIPS: Okay. 1 MR. BRISBIN: I know that he said the city 2 limits of Reno. But I was wondering, is that an 3 artificial boundary? Are there adjacent areas that are 4 nearby that maybe should be looked at and included in the scope of work for both of those proposals? 6 MS. CAKIROGLU: Well, this is Christi Cakiroglu 7 with Keep Truckee Meadows Beautiful. 8 And our proposal was to draft a plan based upon 9 the guidelines that were provided in the RFP. 10 guidelines for the RFP designated a specific area. And 11 that will be phase one of our plan. 12 MS. PHILLIPS: Can you remind me what that 13 definition of the phase one limit was? 14 MS. CAKIROGLU: That would be from Chalk Bluff 15 to the Glendale intake. 16 MS. PHILLIPS: Okay. 17 Does that answer your question? 18 MS. DONALDSON: This is Sue. I have a 19 question. Do you know how many private property owners 20 there are within -- that are along the river, that would 21 be affected by or contributing to the management plan 22 within that phase one area? Have you guys looked at 23 that yet? 24 MS. CAKIROGLU: No, we haven't. 25

MS. PHILLIPS: Jerry --1 MS. DONALDSON: Because I'm just wondering how, 2 how you envision working with those private property 3 It seems to me, to come up with a meaningful 4 management plan, that considers more than just trash and 5 debris, that that could be quite a lengthy process to work with that large number of stakeholders. 7 MS. CAKIROGLU: Yeah, absolutely. We already 8 have a large number of stakeholders, if you just account for the organized groups --10 MS. DONALDSON: Right. 11 MS. CAKIROGLU: -- that, you know, provide 12 service and have ownership of sections of the Truckee 13 River. 14 You're right, that will add a significant 15 number of additional stakeholders, when you consider the 16 private landowners. But that'll be something that we'll 17 address during the initial stakeholder meeting when --18 in the plan, we talk about how we will identify eight to 19 10 key stakeholders. And identifying how we're going to 20 connect with all the individual property owners will be 21 something that will be addressed at that time. 22 MS. PHILLIPS: Okay. 23 MS. DONALDSON: And I have a question about the 24 budget, Christi. And you have the \$22,000 from the 25

Northern Nevada Water Planning Commission. I probably 1 didn't say that correctly. But what, what is that 2 amount to be used for? 3 MS. CAKIROGLU: That's to the preliminary 4 planning, the initial getting here phase, the 5 preplanning for the plan. 6 MS. REBAN: This is Alicia Reban with Nevada 7 Land Trust. 8 That includes the stakeholder identification 9 that Christi was just mentioning as well. 10 MS. DONALDSON: Who, who would be doing that 11 part? Is that your contractor? That's where I'm trying 12 to get from, is what specifically is that funding? 13 it funding the consultant? Is it funding other people? 14 I don't understand, that's all. 15 MS. CAKIROGLU: Yeah, it's providing support 16 for Nevada Land Trust and Keep Truckee Meadows Beautiful 17 and, you know, so --18 MS. REBAN: So we can dedicate -- this is 19 Alicia. 20 So that we can dedicate the appropriate time 21 and energy to the projects in support of Jeff's work 22 with the City of Reno, in support of the National Park 23 Service. We, of course, have the rec trails grant. And 24 Barbara Rice is coming in to help with some of those 25

early stakeholder meetings and stakeholder 1 identification. And so that is, the 22,000 is earmarked for support of those processes and just getting 3 everything rolling forward. 4 That makes good sense, and I MS. DONALDSON: 5 appreciate it. But the level of detail in your budget 6 is sort of -- doesn't allow us to see that. 7 There is a form that normally would be used, 8 right, Tracy, for a proposal budget? 9 There is a template for the MS. TURNER: 10 budget, yes. 11 MS. DONALDSON: Yeah. 12 MS. PHILLIPS: It's in here, isn't it? 13 It's in here. MS. LYNN: 14 MS. PHILLIPS: I thought I got it. 15 MS. TURNER: Are you looking at page six of the 16 proposal, Sue? And then, also --17 MS. DONALDSON: I am. 18 MS. TURNER: And then, also, the match portion 19 is on page five, and there is a description of the match 20 there. 21 MS. DONALDSON: Yes. And so when I look at --22 and I'm looking at it sideways, you guys, so. And maybe 23 I'm just having a hard time because it's sideways on my 24 screen. But it just doesn't spell out what that 22,000 25

is and what it's going to be used for. So now I 1 understand that. 2 MS. PHILLIPS: So are you content on that 3 point, Sue? 4 MS. DONALDSON: Yes. I just think the budget 5 could have been clearer. 6 MR. CAMERON: This is Michael. I have a 7 follow-up question. MS. PHILLIPS: Okay. On the same proposal? 9 MR. CAMERON: Yes. 10 MS. PHILLIPS: Okay. Go ahead. 11 MR. CAMERON: I'm just curious. It wasn't 12 If I missed it, I apologize. The \$74,000 for 13 the subcontractor, who is the subcontractor, and how is 14 that amount arrived? Is there a -- I just wasn't clear 15 on where that figure -- was that already kind of put 16 Was that a proposal that was put together? Or I'm 17 just curious who the subcontractor is and what that, how 18 that figure was arrived at. 19 MS. CAKIROGLU: This is Christi with KTMB 20 aqain. 21 We haven't identified the subcontractor as of 22 yet. And we are just going to be, basically, looking at 23 whatever scope of work that we can accomplish within the 24 \$74,000 is what we're going to be looking at. 25

1	MS. REBAN: And Alicia here.
2	The precise elements will be identified during
3	that scoping and stakeholder identification process.
4	And the \$74,000 amount was based on Lynda Nelson's
5	previous work on the Washoe County regional open space
6	plan, our work, both Nevada Land Trust in round one and
7	Washoe County in round two, for the \$10 million state
8	Question One funding for the Truckee River, in that
9	whole process where we did a lot of matching of funds
10	and leveraging of funds and that whole process. So.
11	And then Lynda had some additional experience, of
12	course, with planning.
13	And so we feel that that is a fairly good
14	estimate based on prior work that had some similar
15	elements.
16	MS. PHILLIPS: Okay. I think
17	MR. CAMERON: Thank you.
18	MS. PHILLIPS: Anybody, of you three on the
19	phone, have any other questions on this proposal?
20	Because we have a couple people in the room who have
21	their hands up.
22	Okay. Jerry, go ahead.
23	MR. CAMERON: No, I have a question for later
24	for John Enloe, but it can wait.
25	MR. BRISBIN: I don't have any further

questions. 1 MS. PHILLIPS: Okay. Jerry, go ahead. 2 MS. DONALDSON: No, you can go ahead. Thank 3 you. 4 MR. PURDY: Are you sure? 5 I have an awfully difficult time Okay. Yeah. 6 justifying in my mind voting approval of \$90,000 for a 7 I think that the people who fund our Truckee plan. 8 River Fund would much rather see the \$90,000 spent on tangible projects. 10 And I was with federal highways, and we spent a 11 ton of money on plans for the interstate. And this just 12 feels like an aimless plan, not finalized yet, but one 13 floating out there gathering information together. 14 I have a difficult time supporting it. 15 MS. CAKIROGLU: Well, and, Jerry, if I may, and 16 this is Christi with Keep Truckee Meadows Beautiful 17 again, I had a feeling that you would be concerned about 18 the idea of a plan. And I just want to say that what 19 we're looking at is we're looking at a three-phase plan, 20 that in the end is going to -- where, the projection, is 21 going to cost about \$475,000 to complete. 22 And we're looking at a plan that's going to 23 range from, you know, downstream of the river. 24 would be -- I'm sure you've seen the map in there. 25

M-hm (affirmative). MR. PURDY: 1 MS. CAKIROGLU: Yeah, exactly. 2 So we're looking at a comprehensive approach. 3 And I honestly think, to be honest, I think that the 4 Truckee River Fund, I mean this is something that will 5 help guide decisions made going forward, of what 6 restoration projects need to be accomplished and what 7 priority they need to be accomplished. 8 I mean that's the goal. Because we have met with several stakeholders over the last several years, 10 of people who are working along the river who had money 11 to contribute to doing projects along the river. But 12 they're driven by their own agenda. They're not driven 13 by the agenda of what's the priority for the community. 14 And that's the purpose of this plan. 15 MR. PURDY: And then the other thing is that 16 you don't have authority to approve the projects in this 17 plan at the end of the day. 18 MS. CAKIROGLU: M-hm (affirmative). 19 MR. PURDY: The commissioners and whatever does 20 that. 21 MS. CAKIROGLU: M-hm (affirmative). 22 MR. PURDY: So when we talk about a plan, that 23 that's going to be how it is, like it is, for eternity, 24 well, that ain't the way it is. 25

MS. CAKIROGLU: Right.

MR. PURDY: So I just have a tough time approving it. I don't want to take up any more time. I just wanted to let you know how I feel.

MS. CAKIROGLU: Well, I really respect that concern, because you're right. And this plan is not something that we want to put on a shelf. You know, we don't want to put in time, sweat and tears and effort on something that's not going to be utilized.

And so it's going to be really important to us to make sure that we have decision makers that are a part of this process, so that it can be adopted by the county commission, the Reno-Sparks, Reno council, the Sparks council. I mean that's going to be the priority for this plan, is something that it will be utilized, not just by this fund, potentially making decisions moving forward, but also by the cities and the county as they make planning decisions moving forward along the river.

MS. REBAN: This is Alicia Reban.

I just want to add, Jerry, that, I think, what you're seeing here, in our coordination with Jeff and the City of Reno, is a strong desire to approach this one-river initiative collaboratively, comprehensively, across all sectors, so that, you know, we all can see

the path forward, but not wait until the plan is done to 1 start seeing improvements. And so we've got the boots 2 on the ground and -- I think, for this phase one. But 3 we have to be mindful, when we start to work on phase 4 one, whatever we do there is going to immediately affect 5 the neighboring area. Somebody on the phone said, 6 7 "Well, what about these other areas?" We always come back to one river, let's have 8 this important broader conversation and all start to 9 move in a kind of a direction together and balance the 10 planning with the action. 11 MS. PHILLIPS: Thank you. 12 I'd like to get -- John Enloe, he's had his 13 hand up for awhile. 14 MR. ENLOE: I just had a question for both of 15 you just as confirmation. But is it one of -- the boots 16 on the ground aspect is great. But, I think, what we've 17 seen, it's a once and done type thing. Where isn't one 18 of the goals of the plan to identify a long-term funding 19 source for --20 MS. REBAN: Yes. 21 MS. CAKIROGLU: Exactly. 22 MR. ENLOE: -- the boots on the ground 23 programs? 24 MS. CAKIROGLU: Exactly. I mean we've seen 25

groundhogs dig down along the river. I mean it's just a 1 problem you turn over and over again. So part of the 2 plan is going to be identifying those problems and 3 identifying solutions to those problems long-term and 4 moving forward. 5 M-hm (affirmative). MS. REBAN: 6 MS. CAKIROGLU: As well as funding sources to 7 solve those problems. 8 MS. REBAN: So no more Band-Aids. So we've got 9 a lot of work to do in that regard. But have this sort 10 of overall health, well-being, healing, if you will, of 11 the entire system and really looking, looking toward the 12 future and the big picture. 13 MS. PHILLIPS: Yeah. Are you satisfied? 14 MR. ENLOE: M-hm (affirmative). 15 MS. PHILLIPS: Okay. So I see no more hands up 16 With regard to this first proposal, KTMB, anybody 17 out there in telephone land have any further questions? 18 MR. CAMERON: This is Michael. If I could just 19 ask John Enloe. 20 You know, this is first a little comment, I 21 You know, so often, most of the time, the 22 proposals that we get are, you know, the idea of outside 23 parties who are, you know, bringing good projects to be 24 funded. And then, periodically, you know, TMWA staff 25

comes forward with real priorities from TMWA's 1 perspective. And this, unless I'm not remembering 2 correctly, this is one of those where, you know, the 3 problems with the waste along the river near the treatment plants are just a priority for TMWA. 5 And so, I guess, I'm curious if John could 6 speak for a minute. Because, I think, it was the case 7 that TMWA staff has actually been pretty involved in the 8 development of these proposals. So I was just -- if 9 John would just speak for a moment about how well he 10

thinks those proposals -- I know, Janet, you want to move to a vote on the first one. But if he could just

comment on, from TMWA's perspective, how well he thinks

these proposals are going to support the needs that

15 staff had already identified along the river.

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MR. ENLOE: Yeah. The City of Reno proposal is very welcomed. Because, I think, as anybody who's walked out there along the river can see, there's an ongoing need for cleanup efforts.

But, I think, the problem that we have experienced is really a lack of a coordinated effort, a lack of a long-term buy-in to this process of improving the river corridor, not only from our perspective. I think, the City of Reno's proposal touched on it, too, making people feel safe and comfortable to go down along

the river and enjoy it. 1 So if we could get -- I think, it's important. 2 Personally, I think, the planning aspect of this is 3 important as well to get the buy-in of the stakeholders along the river so that we could keep this effort going. 5 And I think it's comparable to some of the projects that 6 were funded earlier as far as really doing some 7 background planning work so we could really prioritize 8 our efforts and where the money needs to be spent. 9 Does that answer your question? 10 And I'd like to hear the City of Reno's 11 proposal, too, since the two of them did coordinate 12 together, hear their proposal and make sure everybody 13 understands how the two are complementary to one another 14 before we vote on either one, if that's okay. 15 MS. PHILLIPS: Actually, that was my thought, 16 We're going to ask questions and hear about both 17 proposals and then vote after that. 18 MR. CAMERON: Thank you for the answer. 19 MS. PHILLIPS: So shall we hear from the City 20 of Reno, or does anybody have any follow-up with KTMB 21 and Land Trust? 22 Okay. Questions for Jeff Mann, who's sitting 23 here ready to answer them. 24 Yeah, Jerry. 25

            MR. PURDY: I wasn't sure where that fell.

            MR. MANN: Yeah, this is within City of Sparks.
19
   And one of the challenges that we have is that the river
20
   doesn't obey political boundaries. And my jurisdiction
21
   is limited only to City of Reno property, whether it's a
22
   park property or street rights-of-way.
23
            And a lot of the issues that we have with
24
   clean-up and debris on the river, it's not actually on
25
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City of Reno property. Some of it is. But a lot, it's 1 The river itself, as you know, is state-owned. Many of the issues are on railroad right-of-way or NDOT 3 right-of-way. 4 So without an overall plan to address, to bring 5 in all the participating agencies that have -- that 6 touch the river, you know, anything that we do is going 7 to be incomplete. So we strongly support the overall 8 plan to bring all the major players together in a cooperative effort. 10 But having said that, we're still willing to 11 proceed with the limited effort that we can do on the 12 projects, on the sites that we have direct access to. 13 MR. PURDY: Well, the sad commentary, in my 14 mind, is this has been dragging on. Those sandbags 15 weren't put out there yesterday. They were put out to 16 protect during the '97 flood. And we're finding 17 excuses, we haven't got a plan, that's not my 18 jurisdiction, we can't do anything. No criticism to you 19 or being degrading.
