So in my little video clip on the news, I was saying, you know, there's -- it's not a lot, but it's contributing to the watershed, and everything that we can do to improve the watershed helps, you know, every little thing helps. And so, so, you know, here I've been saying that since -- for a long, long time now.

And so I just wanted to say how appreciative I am to TMWA for developing the Truckee River Fund, and all of you, just to tell you that, you know, you guys are doing a great job. It's making a huge difference, I think, in the watershed as a whole. And it takes time. So, you know, just, just feel very good about what you're doing and the contributions. And it may take a

    for awards, and it will be $800,000 this year.

   that Tracy noticed is the amount we're getting from TMWA
20
   has gone down.

            MS. TURNER: Right.
            MS. PHILLIPS: And the money, some of the
23
   money, used to be a million dollars a year, is going to
24

   cloud seeding. So they've kind of taken right off the
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top, part of the funding we used to deliberate about. 1 Whether you think cloud seeding works or 2 3 doesn't work, it concerns me a little bit that an applicant can, basically, bypass that process by going directly to the TMWA Board. On the other hand, that is 5 6 their prerogative. So, just an editorial comment on that. 7 Any questions for Tracy on the fund balance? 8 MR. PENROSE: Can I add to what you just said? 9 MS. PHILLIPS: Yeah. 10 11 (Candice Elder arrived at the meeting.) MR. PENROSE: Yeah, I understand your -- that 12 perspective. But, I think, from a TMWA leadership 13 perspective, there are limited dollars available on an 14 annual basis for Truckee River related activities. 15 And what they preferred to do with the cloud 16 seeding is kind of differentiate and with the 17 recognition that the cloud seeding was more water 18 supply-oriented and not related to watershed protection 19 and water quality. So they decided to break it out. 20 And so that's been the thought process over 21 there the last couple of years. 22 I do think it would be a nice thing to get back 23 up to the funding level that we had four to five years 24 25 ago, which was about a million a year.

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if Christi goes first? She has a time constraint. 1 Do you have, also, a time constraint? 2 3 MS. SVETICH: I have a doctor's appointment at 10:00 o'clock. I knew that I had to be fast. But, go ahead. So. That's my --5 MS. PHILLIPS: I think, we have plenty of time. 6 MR. CAKIROGLU: Yeah. I'll be, I'll try and be 7 quick. I didn't realize that this group had grown so 8 large. So I actually asked the nice lady out front to 9 10 make more copies. I wanted to -- you know, as Ron knows and Tracy 11 knows, we received an anonymous donation from a woman 12 who lives downtown, in February of 2012. She gifted 13 KTMB with \$50,000 to focus on Truckee River 14 beautification and to purchase a vehicle. Because she 15 16 had contacted me just out of the blue. She is a frequent user of the river. And she had contacted me. 17 And I was telling her about what KTMB does. And I told 18 her, you know, that one of our challenges was we needed 19 a vehicle. And so that was why she included that in her 20 gift. 21 22 When we received the funding, obviously -- and Keep Truckee Meadows Beautiful, for those of you who 23 don't know, we're a small nonprofit. Our budget's about 24 \$220,000. We have three full-time staff. That gift was 25

1 huge for us.

And so we really wanted to honor what she was requesting of us. And we wanted to make sure that we, you know, responded to her needs and fulfilled something that would carry on long-term.

We -- basically, the entire shift, the entire organization has shifted our focus so that we're focused on the river. And what I just am passing around to you -- and I'm sorry, there's more copies coming -- is, basically, a report that I'm going to be sending to her to share with her what has -- what the outcome has been of her gift.

And so what we are doing is we have tried -- we realized early on that going and doing ongoing cleanups -- I mean the mission of KTMB is to create a camera-beautiful region. It's not to do annual cleanups every year. Our big focus is prevention. And so what we wanted to do with her gift was look at how can we maintain a clean Truckee River long-term. You know, if we were to expend that money in doing additional cleanups, we would need to keep doing additional cleanups. So how do we focus on prevention?

And the prevention key, what we feel like, is finding a full-time river ranger. Because we discovered that the City of Reno had a full-time river ranger

through their park department up until the recession hit, and that was really successful, and that that river ranger partnered with the City of Reno Police Department and homeless advocacy group working out of the Greyhound bus station. And they were able to keep individuals moving along and help provide resources to individuals.

And that fell apart with the recession. I mean we have had a lot of camps where people are actually embedded in certain areas along the river, I mean especially at Oxbow Park. I mean you could be standing two feet away from a massive camp and not even know it because of the thick willows out there. And that, you know, is a degradation to the river. I mean we've got food pits down there, with all that rinsing into the Truckee River, which is a source of our drinking supply. You know, and so it's like how, how do we address these issues?

And so, basically, we -- I started meeting with different stakeholders along the river. Susan Lynn was actually my first stop, when we received that gift. And we have come down to realizing that the issue of maintaining a clean river is much larger than KTMB, obviously. I mean there's a homeless issue that needs to be addressed.

And I'm happy to report, towards the end of the

report, that there's a group, new group that's meeting. 1 One of the ideas, our initial ideas with this project 2 was to try and create a river summit, where we brought 3 in different stakeholder groups and human service 4 organizations and things like, that to talk about the 5 issue of the river and how to maintain a clean river. 6 But, you know, we realized early on that that could really blow up in our face, and it could be perceived 8 that we were antihomeless, you know, and that kind of 9 thing. 10 But what's great is there's a service 11 organization, and Tracy Turner's actually helping 12 coordinate it, talking about other states' practices for 13 different services organizations in town, and they 14 identified one of their number one priorities in being 15 successful is being able to walk along the river and 16 have it be -- not have people living there. You know, 17 so that was a huge win, I thought, in that we were able 18 to raise the bar there with the human services 19 20 organizations that this is an issue. You know, the clean community, you know, is connecting with the human 21 22 service, you know, and kind of how that impacts. 23 So, anyways, KTMB, our concrete, the concrete steps that we have, we're developing Adopt-A-River 24

program. So it's going to be a year-round program.

25

It's going to be part of our Adopt-A-Spot where we have of the roadside litter pickups. And we are going to be bringing that before the municipalities this fall, hopefully, this summer get it approved, so we can implement this fall, and have different sections in the river up for adoption, so we can get more community groups down there helping to clean up the river.

We are -- you guys are actually helping fund our Weed Warriors education video. But we've also secured funding for our Watershed Warriors education video, where we go out into schools and educate kids about how important it is to maintain a clean river, giving them concrete examples of how they can do that, and the importance of a clean river, because that is the source of our water supplies.

And we're still continuing to work with local municipalities to raise, you know, the red flag that we need to do something long-term to keep the river clean. I'm taking Councilman Hillary Schieve and Councilman Oscar Delgado on a tour of the river next week to show them what happens when -- without a full-time river ranger.

And so, I think, Tracy just asked me to come today just so we can kind of share with you just kind of the work that we've been doing behind the scenes.

As far as next steps, I understand -- I don't -- are you guys familiar with the SQ-1 funding from 2002? There was \$10 million in funding from the state that was gifted to Washoe County. And they still have a little bit of that money that they can reallocate. We came across this about a month ago.

And so that money could be reallocated somewhere to develop a long-term plan for the river. Of course, KTMB's focus and our focus has to be Verdi to Vista. I mean that's our area. And, but, you know, there's other groups that need to be engaged, too, you know. There's, you know, California. There's the Pyramid Tribe.

And so we've been talking with Washoe County about maybe having them develop a river summit. Because that's something that we've had as like a long-term thing. And, you know, if we can get different groups together in the room talking about what it is that they're doing, maybe we can establish better ways of collaboration, so we can develop long-term solutions. And that could be part of developing a plan.

And it sounds like there's Q-1 funding left over that could help develop a plan. They don't think they have a money for the plan. And I'm not a hundred percent certain that KTMB would be the best agency to,

you know, be steering that plan. But it's something 1 that needs -- I think, this room needs to be aware of, 2 3 that it's out there. And maybe that's something that 4 could be done long-term. It sounds like the county is talking to Nature 5 Conservancy about having a plan developed. My 6 understanding was that The Nature Conservancy didn't 7 feel like that that was something that they could do, 8 9 because they lost Patty Bakker. So, anyway, there's just long-term solutions, 10 I think, that need to be continually addressed, and 11 12 KTMB's trying to do that. MS. TURNER: Okay. 13 MS. PHILLIPS: So, Christi, so, over the years, 14 we've thrown money at Cleanup Day. 15 MS. CAKIROGLU: M-hm (affirmative). 16 MS. PHILLIPS: And some homeless eradication 17 things and lots of weed things. I guess, I didn't 18 realize, there is no overarching plan. 19 MS. CAKIROGLU: There is no long-term plan. 20 met with the Truckee River Fund project; and except for 21 their property, there is no plan. 22 MS. PHILLIPS: Huh. 2.3 MS. CAKIROGLU: And I have to say, you know, I 24 took Ron Penrose down on the tour. And you'll see that 25

1 in the report, you know.

And I think that there is room for annual cleanups. I think, that's a good thing to get citizens, the residents down there on the river and taking ownership of the river and cleaning it up. But there does need to be something more. There needs to be a long-term solution.

And, that's -- you know, we're looking at Adopt-A-River. That's going to be good. But that's still kind of -- I mean, I think, my impression is that the real solution is a full-time river ranger, with some sort of law enforcement authority behind it, that can patrol the length of the river, keep people moving along, have a vehicle that can remove some of the camps, some of the trash that's left behind there. I mean that is, over the course of the last couple years working on this, that seems to be the best solution for us.

And I've talked with the sheriff's office. And the sheriff's office, honestly, they have been tremendous. I mean without the work that they have been doing that you guys have funded, we would be lost. They have removed so many camps and so much trash. I mean they've really been saviors there. And so that's been super helpful. But they are not willing to house like a river ranger unless they get like three years worth of

1 funding.

And so, you know, City of Reno, I took Mayor
Cashell down there along the river. And, of course, he
was really supportive. But he's like, "You know, you
need to get the council people down there, you need to
the get the council people behind it."

You know, so we're trying to work that angle, too. But, you know, any help that you guys could bring to bear to try to get one of those, to have a full-time river ranger working along there, would be fantastic.

MS. PHILLIPS: Yeah, Jerry.

MR. PURDY: Help me with this. No criticism. But you've had an awfully nice presentation, and the thing I'd like to see is that we spend money, or you people get into making sure we get rid of those homeless. We were down there just last night taking a walk along the river with some friends. And there was about six of them packed in around there. They were all visiting, and they all had their blankets. And they all just were really kind of scruffy and obnoxious sort of people. And I don't think Wyatt Earp would go down there at night with that situation.

And it's great to talk about a lot of other things. But that's a core issue, that if you want people to feel safe walking the river, you better get

    rid of those guys.

             MS. CAKIROGLU: I agree.
 3
             MR. PURDY: They're sleeping on the benches.
             MS. CAKIROGLU: I agree. I mean we are so
 4
    lucky in this community to have such a jewel like the
 5
    river flowing through our city. And we're not
 6
    maintaining it like we should. And there is no
    overseeing organization. There's no master plan of how
 8
    we can maintain the river and take care of it long-term.
 9
             MR. PURDY: So I'd like to see us fund getting
10
    rid of the homeless, as far as my vote goes.
11
            MS. CAKIROGLU: That's such a complex
12
   procedure.
13

            MS. PHILLIPS: Yeah, Bill.
15
            MS. CAKIROGLU: That's such a complex issue. I
   mean that's so much bigger than one organization.
16
            MS. PHILLIPS: Yeah, Bill, you had your hand
17

   up.
            MR. BRADLEY: Has someone figured out the cost
19
   of a full-time river ranger?
20
21
            MS. CAKIROGLU: Yeah, you know, I put some
22
   numbers together. And, you know, the City of Reno right
   now, they are trying to save costs by hiring contract
23
   workers. And so it would be really smart if they were
24
   able to hire a contract worker for their park staff.
25
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And they could do that like at 50, 60, 70 thousand
dollars. I mean that would be really easy to make that
happen. And, I think, they would be willing to do that.
They just need to find the funding.

Getting -- what we've been working on at KTMB is trying to get the political will for them to allocate the funding for that. And so we just keep taking, you know, the council people down there and showing them that.

MR. PURDY: We do Rock Park all the time, riding our bikes. And in Sparks, they don't have any problem with the homeless. From the Grand Sierra clear up to five miles or so out there to Vista, they don't have any problems. It's just down here in Dodge that they can't get together and do something about that.

MS. CAKIROGLU: I think, this is an important piece for you to know. Right now, the City of Reno section of the river is far worse than the City of Sparks. But I think that any approach that needs to be taken as far as a long-term plan or long-term solution, the river ranger, it has to be a multijurisdictional solution. Because, you know, if the City of Reno is only focusing on one section in the City of Reno before they move to other sections, then those areas are going to become a problem.

So we need to look at something that's going to 1 be a long-term solution along the length of the river. 2 MS. PHILLIPS: Okay. Susan. 3 4 MS. LYNN: This is kind of like deja vu. MS. CAKIROGLU: Yeah, I'm sure. 5 MS. LYNN: At one time there was a very close 6 working relationship with the river ranger and the 7 homeless shelter. And there was a triage where when they came to -- when the river ranger came to a homeless 9 camp, we could refer people to the police. We could 10 refer them to the homeless shelter. We could refer them 11 to other services that were available. But, again, 12 because of the recession, there has been -- those all 13 have gone away. And I think there is a case of 14 community effort there. And, I agree, it needs a 15 political will. 16 The other thing is that while we are recycling 17 in this community, we are not totally recycling. And I 18 also live in Tucson a little bit of the time. And they 19 have a program down there where they have barrels for 2.0 21 recycling downtown. And you can put your cans in one, your plastic in another, and whatever, everywhere. But 22 they also encourage people to cover their loads when 23 going to the dump. And if you arrive at the dump with 24 an uncovered load, you will be penalized \$20 for 25

1 bringing trash in uncovered.

And it seems to me that the waste management station here could do something similar. You are allowed to bring recyclables as long as they're tied together, they're tied down or they're covered. And I've used that service in Tucson a number of times.

But there's no incentive here. And, quite frankly, if you look downstream of the transfer station, there is trash everywhere. And it's blow-away trash.

So there are two issues here. One is the homeless, and two is the trash.

MS. CAKIROGLU: Right. And the user trash is what KTMB referred to. We decided we can focus on that. And what's interesting is we've been told by our park friends is they've eliminated a bunch of trash cans, because they don't have the staff to maintain them. So instead of having overflowing trash cans that they're not dumping, there's no trash cans. So that's kind of an issue.

The other thing is we've been able, we have, we've developed a partnership with the Washoe County Health District. And we're using some of their funding to develop a PSA, trying to link trash in the clean river with the water supply. And so we're working on that as well.

1 MS. PHILLIPS: Yeah, Michael. MR. CAMERON: Christi, a couple questions. 2 So is part of what you're suggesting or the main thing 3 you're suggesting, first step is to develop a plan? MS. CAKIROGLU: You know, I don't know that I'm 5 suggesting anything. I think, I'm just letting you quys 6 know what it is we've been doing and kind of the 7 conclusions that we've come to. And, I think, a plan 8 would be a great idea. I mean that would be a great 9 start. 10 11 I'm not an expert in plans. I've been working 12 with Lynda Nelson, who is an expert in plans, and Jennifer Budge at the county. And they don't think that 13 there's enough SQ-1 funding to fund a full plan. 14 They do think that there's funding to get a 15 16 summit, a river summit together. Which, I think, it would be a better idea for them to do a river summit 17 than KTMB, because, again, KTMB's focus. We just don't 18 have the capacity to have, to host a river summit that 19 stretches from Tahoe to Pyramid. I mean that's just not 2.0 us. But that, that needs to happen. 21 MR. CAMERON: Okay. Because I mean, I think, 22 one thing I would just to try to -- I mean there are a 23 lot of plans. 24 25 MR. PURDY: Yeah.

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MR. CAMERON: I mean there's so many different

    plans. The wastewater facility has plans. The Fish and

    corridor. I mean there are a lot of plans on a lot of

   different things. But that part seems like -- and back

   to the river ranger, do we need to kind of establish,

   know, three options for addressing the problem, the
   river ranger is one, and then there are a few others,
21
   and then here are the costs?

            I mean is that -- I'm trying to figure out what
2.3
   you're thinking of when you say "a plan." Because, I
24
   think, we need to narrow and be more specific about what
25
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1 kind of plan you're talking about.

MS. CAKIROGLU: Well, when I refer to a plan, I was shocked, as shocked as Janet, to find out that nobody had a plan for using it. I mean, you know, there are other communities, like Austin, Texas, that they have this great river walk, you know, that kind of thing, and they have -- you know, there's a plan for that. I think, we're smart enough to have a plan for that here, but nobody does.

So I'm not asking you guys for anything. I'm just sharing with you what it is that we're working on, because I think that you guys are a greater mind than just myself. And, you know, you know more. You work with all these different entities. And it may be that it is time for us to do a river summit. In which case, KTMB could host that. I mean that's our focus.

MS. PHILLIPS: Candice, you had your hand up.

MS. ELDER: I was going to ask if you had looked at different, other communities to see if they have like -- it sounds to me almost like a community plan, you know, or a -- I don't know, kind of a keep your community clean type of plan.

But I know there -- I mean like I would look at it, you know, to see whether or not Boise, which is a similar, you know, town with a river going through it.

And then there's -- I mean there's a million others. 1 MS. CAKIROGLU: Yes. And there's other 2 communities that have found a better solution from 3 homeless than what we have currently. But, again, it's just educating people and raising the bar and getting 5 people bought in to doing that. MS. ELDER: Do you have that, you know, that 7 research where they -- you know, like you say, there are 8 other communities that have found a better solution. we have anything to go on? Do you have something to 10 show the council people here or, you know, anybody here 11 that, hey, this is what this community specifically has 12 done to address this? 13 MS. CAKIROGLU: Yes. I mean you can see early 14 on -- which community was it? 15 MS. ELDER: I'm sorry I don't have it here. 16 17 MS. CAKIROGLU: That's okay. Let me see. Early on, I think, it was in Colorado, that that 18 community -- anyway, there is a community in Colorado 19 that had a -- I think, it was Colorado Springs, that 20 they found a better solution for the homeless. And 21 maybe that research didn't make it into this report. 22 2.3 But, yeah, I mean we've done all that. But, again, we're Keep Truckee Meadows 24 Beautiful. We're not a homeless advocacy group. 25

1 MS. ELDER: Right. MS. CAKIROGLU: So we want to work with, we 2 would be happy to work with that. But I don't know that 3 we're the ones to take charge. So we're just trying to 4 5 raise a red flag about it. MS. ELDER: Right. 6 MS. CAKIROGLU: And the exciting thing is, you 7 know, instead of getting a backlash, so far, groups are 8 saying, "Oh, yeah, you know, this could be an area in 9 which we could work together." So I'm hoping that this 10 11 continues. MS. PHILLIPS: Yeah, Ron and then Jerry. 12 MR. PENROSE: Yeah, I'm familiar with this 13 issue for a long time. At one time, I was a water plant 14 manager at Chalk Bluff. And it was an annual activity 15 to go down to get the sheriff's department and roust out 16 these homeless camps close to our water plant intakes. 17 So it's -- the whole homeless issue, you can't 18 deal with this. That's a political issue. And a lot of 19 20 these politicians, they don't want to touch it. But regardless of that, you could still do a 21 prevention thing with a ranger. 22 MS. CAKIROGLU: M-hm (affirmative). 23 MR. PENROSE: And, to me, it's just a funding 24 issue primarily. 25

MS. CAKIROGLU: M-hm (affirmative). 1 MR. PENROSE: And, I think, there are -- of 2 course, Truckee River Fund could help out with that a 3 little bit. But this also gets into tourism, economic 4 development. So I think that a resource would be the 5 RC, the Reno-Sparks Convention Authority. Right? 6 7 MS. CAKIROGLU: Yeah. MR. PENROSE: That's potentially a big source 8 of funds. 9 MS. CAKIROGLU: Yeah. 10 11 MR. PENROSE: And that's the gaming industry. MS. CAKIROGLU: Right. 12 MR. PENROSE: And that's part of the problem. 13 14 Right? MS. CAKIROGLU: Right. 15 MR. PENROSE: Have you ever thought about going 16 before them? 17 MS. CAKIROGLU: No. That's a really good idea. 18 19 We met with EDAWN. MR. PENROSE: Right. I've got EDAWN down here. 2.0 But Reno-Sparks Convention Authority, where it ties 21 22 directly back to the economy of this region. 23 MS. CAKIROGLU: Yeah. Well, maybe that's something I can mention to Hillary and Oscar when I'm 2.4 taking them on a tour. Because if it's something that 25

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they get bought in with, maybe we could get a meeting

    with them.

             MR. PENROSE: Yeah.
             MS. CAKIROGLU: Because they have more say.
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 5
             MR. PENROSE: So, you know, you have -- you're
 6
    bringing in visitors to the town. And the visitors are
    becoming more and more diverse. They're not necessarily
    gaming-oriented, but they may be staying at a downtown

    hotel and taking part in recreational activities. And,

    you know, one of those is walking the river.

    thing, is I know you guys were a source of funding. But

    there's also that non-point water solution fund for

   NDEP. I mean that's something that I've suggested to

    other groups when I go talk to them. Because, you know,

    I mean, again, I think, this river ranger, I mean Great
22
   Basin has used the help of a river ranger. KTMB, we

   could go in that direction.

            But, I think, this needs to be something that's
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helped by the municipality. I mean it needs to have the 1 authority of a municipality to have that full-time 2 position. 3 MR. PENROSE: And there's one more source, too. 4 You should take this whole issue before what's called 5 the Staff Working Group. And that's a local working 6 group representing the various governmental agencies 7 relating to water and wastewater issues. And you can 9 bring that up. And then you could, might be able to make a presentation before the Northern Nevada Water 10 Planning Commission. 11 12 MS. CAKIROGLU: Okay. MR. PENROSE: All right. And that could be a 13 prelude to taking some type of funding request to the 14 Western Regional Water Commission as part of their 15 16 annual budget. MS. PHILLIPS: I want to give Jerry a chance to 17 make a comment but, also, kind of want to focus in on 18 the purpose of this discussion is for us to know what 19 20 you're doing, which I think is admirable, and to pick our collective brains here. 2.1 Are we looking at any kind of action item here? 22 MS. LEONARD: This wasn't identified as an 23 action item. So. 24

So. And then, and so I'm

MS. PHILLIPS: Yeah.

25

sure you're on the list for RFPs. And certainly an RFP having to do with this would probably be appropriate.

So I kind of wanted to just be clear about what's the end point of this discussion?

MS. CAKIROGLU: You know, I think, this is something that Tracy and Ron are both aware of what we're doing behind the scenes. And, I think, it's just to let the rest of you know what's happening.

Again, I mean I'm not convinced that KTMB would be the one to come and ask for funding for a full-time river ranger. I mean we just don't have that kind of authority or capacity, but. But I can just tell you that, you know, KTMB has been doing a lot of work for the last couple of years to try and identify long-term solutions. And the full-time river ranger is one of those solutions.

MS. PHILLIPS: Okay. Yeah, Jerry.

MR. PURDY: Yeah, my feelings go along that way. It breaks my heart to listen to a young lady like you, that's got a lot of talent, and people talking about we've got to get together, we've got to develop a plan, we've got to have a strategy. I'm retired, and, my god, I listened all my working life -- I'm an engineer -- to that kind of talk. And I sure wouldn't want to see our group spend a penny on funding for a

1 plan.

I'd like to see KTMB, because you're supposed to be keeping the river beautiful -- that's what your bag is -- get together and show some leadership, develop solutions to the problem and list them. Go talk to somebody if you want to. But come back with the top three or four things that need to be done that will correct this, like the river ranger.

And Sparks has a garbage truck that they can drive down the middle of the street and pick up things. Reno doesn't. And they make all different kind of equipment.

MS. CAKIROGLU: M-hm (affirmative).

MR. PURDY: And you wouldn't have to have manpower coming out to empty the garbage cans, because there isn't any real garbage can. They just throw stuff in the river or on the ground.

MS. PHILLIPS: Michael.

MR. CAMERON: So I actually have a different point of view, and I can make this short, is I actually think, because part of the complexity is there are so many different interests, none of whom are the natural point leader, but if there are homeless issues, there are tourism issues, there's water quality issues, I think, the idea of pulling people together is good. I

think, having -- for me, there's -- right now, I mean 1 I'm kind of following you. But I don't think there is a 2 clearly defined problem. You know, just a step-wise 3 progression, I mean I get it. I believe, there's a 4 problem out there. But exactly what is it that, you 5 know, we're trying to solve? And what are the options? And I would favor, and I don't know if you're 7 willing to do this, but if KTMB or one of the other, the 8 county or somebody else you're working closely with, would be willing to undertake not an expensive, you 10 know, three-year study, but something to just sort of 11 better define the problem, better define the options, 12 which would be the basis for having what you're calling 13 a summit or a meeting, rather than pulling people 14 together and everyone has, you know, a million different 15 16 ideas in their minds, and it may not lead to -- I just think, if you had really kind of narrowed down the 17 18 problem and have a range of solutions and how much it's going to cost, that people could then respond to and 19 say, "Well, we can contribute. We believe that this is 20 important." 21 But, I think, the fact that you've got so many 22 2.3 different jurisdictions that need to be part of the solution, I think, we need to start to better define it. 24 So I would favor, I mean if a proposal came 25

forward to do a plan. Again, I mean I'm sympathetic to 1 what Jerry's saying, too. We don't want to spend too 2 3 much of our money on that. But there's a time and a place for planning. And, I think, this might be a good 4 place for it, as a way to get started. 5 So, I think, that would be a good proposal, if 6 you or one of your partners could come forward with 7 that. 8 MS. CAKIROGLU: Okay. I'll take that back. 9 MS. ELDER: I think, a white paper almost, 10 maybe not, you know, like a full plan, but maybe just 11 a --12 MR. CAMERON: Yeah, just a flushed, give it a 13 little bit of definition, an outline, again, what's the 14 problem, what are our solutions, how much it's going to 15 cost, and give people something specific to react to. 16 Because it's a little -- you know, right now, it's a 17 little all over the place. 18 MR. PURDY: Yeah. 19 MS. PHILLIPS: Can I -- I'd like to kind of 20 draw this to a close. 21 22 MR. PURDY: Yeah, we're getting away. 23 MS. PHILLIPS: And not prejudge the merits of any proposal that may or may not come in the door. 24 Because we will have a lively discussion, I'm sure, at 25

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that time.

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MS. SVETICH: Well, I'll do a quick overview. 1 And I do have some presentation. And this is, this 2 3 is -- there's really two presentations in one. So, I guess, I'll just pass that around. And 4 I'll just go over it very quickly. But I have 10 copies 5 there. 6 This is the Highland Canal project. You know, 7 you'd seen it before, years ago, where we've focused on 8 source control. But TMWA brought it back to us and 9 said, you know, there's still some issues. 10 We still have those folks that have the horses 11 close to the canal. You can see on this first page 12 there's a big ol' manure pile. That just has continued 13 14 to be maintained a big ol' manure pile. So, you know, there's still a lot of issues 15 just on private property that we have no control over. 16 So we have been continuing to work on this project. 17 So if you'd just go to the second page, you can 18 see it's up in the Mesa Park/MayAnne area. And the 19 Highland Canal was never designed to or intended to 20 carry stormwater. It was a conveyance for, principally, 21 22 to get water for irrigation or water supply. And Chalk Bluff, the treatment plant, has never been intended or 23 designed to treat stormwater. So poor source water 24 quality results in higher treatment costs. And Washoe 25

Sparks and Washoe County, we have a permit issued by the state to manage stormwater quality so. TMWA does not.

2.2

So, again, you know, we've got those rural uses up there. And I'm on the third page there.

The City of Reno has been pursuing the funding. We've been working with TMWA and Washoe County on principals of an interlocal agreement. TMWA is proceeding with the completion of the design and securing permits. City of Reno will provide the projects management and long-term maintenance of Reno facilities, while Washoe County will also provide some inspection, easements and long-term maintenance of Washoe County facilities.

Now, that, the third page with the tables, when I came before you last August, we had a schedule. And one of the first things, we did make the application for the 319 grant funds. Those grant funds did not come through. So had to go to plan B. And, of course, that resulted in quite the shift of schedule.

So if you look at the one on the bottom, we were approved for \$250,000 by the WRWC, the Western Regional Water Commission, just last month. So, with that approval, we have sufficient funding for the match to the Truckee River Fund.

And, also, TMWA has initiated going forward

with the design and pursuing those permits. And we are still trying to work with Washoe County, principally, on the wording of the interlocal agreement. We, I was really hoping that I would have that done and before our council this month. But it did not come to fruition.

So, with the design, we're anticipating the design's going to be completed by about October, the permit secured by November.

And then, also, Glen Daily here will be taking over this project for me. And he was always -- I always identified him as being the project manager on this anyway. He is a great project manager. And so he will be bringing back the second request, as was discussed last summer when I originally proposed this. So you'll be seeing him with that.

And then we anticipate that the construction will start, probably not until April of next year and completed in July of 2015.

So the funding has been difficult to secure.

But if you look on the next page, you can see a synopsis of that. The \$400,000 that you provided last year has been accepted by council. And then we are hoping for the balance of 329 in August. And then Washoe and Reno will be providing in-kind services in the water management fund, 250,000.

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MS. PHILLIPS: I'm sorry, Terri. The 329,

    2014, that's our upcoming grant cycle?

And we 18 definitely see that there's -- in that first flush, it 19 poses a significant risk to the Truckee River, what we 20 are seeing from storm outfalls, as well as what 21 22 potentially can come into the Highland Canal. So just wanted you to know that we have been 23 initiating the project in terms of preproject 24 monitoring. And then, then, essentially, that it was 25

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really not intended to be a prediscussion of the
