TRUCKEE RIVER FUND ADVISORY COMMITTEE MEETING OF AUGUST 20, 2021

(Meeting via Zoom and teleconference)

The following meeting minutes is a summary of the certified transcript for the Truckee River Fund Advisory Committee meeting held at 8:30 a.m., Friday, August 20, 2021, via Zoom and teleconference.

Agenda Item #1: Roll Call: Roll call was taken. A quorum was noted.

Agenda Item #2: Public comment: There was no public comment at this time.

Agenda Item #3: Approval of the agenda (for possible action): The agenda was unanimously approved.

Agenda Item #4: Approve the May summary meeting minutes (for possible action): The Meeting Minutes (Transcript Summary) for May 21, 2021 was unanimously approved.

Agenda Item #5: Fund balance report: Lauren stated that the amount available to spend is \$718,193.52, which is for the whole year.

Agenda Item #6: Review grant proposals to Truckee River Fund and select projects to be recommended for funding (for possible action): The following grant proposals were

- considered at length and voted on by the group and approved, rejected/declined, or action taken as follows:
- #251, Sierra Nevada Journeys: Watershed Education Initiative for the Urban Truckee River Corridor, amount requested \$30,055. The full amount requested of \$30,055 was unanimously approved. Sean Hill and Alyssa Wagner were present to provide input and answer questions.
- #252, Truckee Meadows Parks Foundation: Dog Waste Awareness Campaign, amount requested \$60,775. The full amount requested of \$60,775 was unanimously approved. Sarah Holcombe was present to provide input and answer questions.
- #253, Truckee River Foundation DBA One Truckee River: OTR River-Friendly Landscaping Program Expansion, amount requested \$48,000. The full amount requested of \$48,000 was unanimously approved. Iris Jehle-Peppard was present to provide input and answer questions.
- #254, Truckee River Foundation DBA One Truckee River: One Truckee River Brodhead Park Restoration Project: Phase 1, amount requested \$69,724. The full amount requested of \$69,724 was unanimously approved. Iris Jehle-Peppard was present to provide input and answer questions. Mandy Bengtson and Susan Mortenson were also present and provided additional input.
- #255, Keep Truckee Meadows Beautiful: KTBM's 2022 Great Community Cleanup, Truckee River Cleanup, Adopt-A-River Program, & Adult and Community Education Program, amount requested \$82,880. The full amount requested of \$82,880 was unanimously approved. Mark Cameron and Laura Szoke were present to provide input and answer questions.
- #256, Washoe County: River Stewards Project, amount requested \$219,164. The full amount requested of \$219,164 was unanimously approved. Catrina Peters, Grant Denton and Brynna Nichols were present to provide input and answer questions. John Enloe requested that two things be added to the scope of work: On page 2, number 4, on providing education, that they add caring for public facilities to that; and then, in number 5, related to the cleaning and such of the Portland Loos, that they add report incidents or damage to One Truckee River. Ms. Peters indicated that was not a problem.
- #257, Truckee River Watershed Council (TRWC): Prosser Basin Sediment Reduction Plan, amount requested \$44,000. The full amount requested of \$44,000 was unanimously approved, with additional language regarding monitoring, the language to be prepared by Don, Terri and Beth, that Lauren will put into the scope. Beth Christman was present to provide input and answer questions.

Project advisors for the approved proposals were assigned as follows: #251, Michael Cameron; #252, Jim Smitherman; #253, Terri Svetich; #254, Don Mahin; #255, Candice Elder; #256, Brian Bonnenfant; and #257, Mike Brisbin.

Agenda Item #7: Committee and staff comments:

There were Committee comments regarding a Committee member being present at TMWA Board meetings when TRF proposals are being considered. Terri will attend the September 15th TMWA Board meeting. Janet and Michael will talk with TMWA Board Member Brekhus regarding repeat proposals. Lauren stated that she does attend those TMWA Board meetings in case there are questions on the grant process.

Michael commented about inviting Iris to come to the next meeting and talk about how One Truckee River prioritizes and what we can expect from them in the future. Similarly, he commented about inviting the Truckee River Watershed Council to join and talk about how they prioritize the projects, and is there anything we'd like them to consider, so that we get the best proposal possible. These conversations might be helpful to reassure the TMWA Board that as we do approve multiple recipients, we're thinking hard about that and are evaluating it. Janet will put these on the November 19th meeting agenda.

Janet commented the other one that wants to give us a short talk is the Truckee Meadows Stormwater Permit Coordinating Committee. Terri commented about how that idea came about when she spoke with Theresa Jones about what the Stormwater Committee is doing and what role they are playing. Janet will put this on the November 19th agenda as well.

Sonia Folsom commented that, unfortunately, they had to cancel their 20th anniversary summer party, which was scheduled on August 28th, due to the situation, but they will plan a bigger one for next year.






Stormwater Permit Coordinating Committee (SWPCC)

- City of Reno administers the program










Watershed Assessments for Tributaries to the Truckee River

- Tributary assessments conducted in 2002, 2005-2012 and 2015-2017
- Baseline 2002 Assessments covered:
- 1. Geographic and hydrologic descriptions of streams
- 2. Relevant physical descriptions
- 3. Geology of soils
- 4. Slope
- 5. Wetlands
- 6. Areas prone to flooding
- 7. Vegetative cover



Tributary Assessments Product: Chalk Creek

- Annual assessments focus on different tributaries and different reaches within each tributary
- Increased inspection frequencies for stream reaches with active degradation
- Problem areas are mapped, assessed and photo documented
- Provide data for 319 grant applications




Background: Chalk Creek

- Development built in 2004
- Chalk Creek realigned as part of Sapphire Ridge development
- 2007 annual watershed assessment identified geotextile failure
- Addressing restoration needs hindered by the 2008 Great Recession and competing priorities



Collaborative Funding Chalk Creek

- 319(h) funding was secured for restoration of Sapphire Ridge section of Chalk Creek
- One Truckee River provided \$10,000 match
- Currently in design phase, restoration planned for 2023
- Bank stabilization is estimated to reduce 48 tons of sediment, 40.6 lbs of phosphorous, and 81.4 lbs of nitrogen annually

Improve garden & lawn maintenance

- Conserve landscape irrigation
- Don't overwater No urban slobber!
- Avoid raking/blowing leaves into street
- Don't over-fertilize and use organic fertilizer



Pick up after pets

Avoid & report prohibited discharges

- Sediment runoff from construction sites
- Commercial or residential car wash wastewater
- Sewer overflows
- · Dumping of liquid waste, such as:
- · Chlorinated pool water
- · Water softener brine backwash
- Reclaimed or recycled water

Also, look for prohibited discharges or other concerning activity that may enter the storm drain system and contact the agencies listed on this pamphlet. Once contacted, we will send an inspector to investigate the problem.

Remember, only rain in the stormdrain!

What is the storm drain system?

Just look out your door!

The municipal storm drain system is made up all infrastructure that transmits stormwater, including: curb and gutters, inlets, pipes, ditches, and channels.

Untreated stormwater flows into the local creeks and into the Truckee River. When a storm hits, storm drains carry concentrated pollution that can cause long-term chemical buildup in the river, which leads into Pyramid Lake.



TRUCKEE RIVER FACTS



Drinking water

80% of TMWA customer's drinking water is supplied by the Truckee River.



Pyramid Lake - the river's terminus

The Truckee River flows into Pyramid Lake, a one-of-a-kind inland desert lake, with world-class fishing. This lake is also sensitive to pollution.



Diverse ecosystem

Mammals, birds, fish, amphibians, plants & insects species are all part of the river's ecosystem.



Ecosystem is sensitive to pollution

The Truckee River's ecosystem is highly sensitive to pollutants, including pesticides, herbicides, and other hazardous chemicals. These pollutants can get humans sick, too.







One Truckee River's (OTR) Priority Action Item Update for November 1, 2021



OTR is a nonprofit that coordinates a partnership of public and private partners who work together to strive for OTR's mission to ensure a healthy and thriving river connected to its community. Our goal to reach our mission is to complete the implementation of the OTR Management Plan. The following is a summary update of prioritized OTR Action Item determined by OTR Partnership Council. If you know of efforts related to OTR prioritized Action items not mentioned, please reach out to OTR staff to have those efforts included.

Water Quality - Goal 1: Ensure and protect water quality and ecosystem health in the Truckee River.

<u>Action Item 1.1.a</u>) Identify location of all high-volume storm drains and the largest storm water contributions to the Truckee River.

• Identification of high-volume storm drains into the river reported in *Truckee Meadows Regional Storm Water Quality Management Program 2017 Stormwater Sampling and Analysis Plan* prepared by Balanced Hydrologics, Inc. prepared for the City of Reno in cooperation with: City of Sparks, Washoe County and the NV Department of Transportation. Now, Truckee Meadows Regional Planning Agency works to map out watershed boundaries.

<u>Action Item 1.2.a)</u> Develop Truckee River Watershed Management Plan through stakeholder coordination and consensus process.

• The 2020 Integrated Source Water and 319(h) Watershed Protection Plan for Public Water Systems and the Truckee River in the Truckee Meadows is complete and approved by the NV Division of Environmental Protection (NDEP). This living document is publicly available at www.WashoeCountyCleanWater.org. Now, the City of Reno is moving the Chalk Creek Project forward, and Truckee Meadows Stormwater Permit Coordinating Committee (TMSWPCC) is exploring a contract with NCE to collect data on select projects identified in the Watershed Protection Plan.

<u>Action Item 1.3.c)</u> Ensure adequate public restrooms along the Truckee River. Initiate a pilot study of temporary restroom facilities in priority areas along the river corridor.

River Restroom Project identifies nine new public restrooms along the river and successfully completed Phase I: a new Portland Loo at Brodhead Park. This Loo has been open to the public for a year with no major incidents, and collaborators are implementing human service outreach, education, and clean-ups along the Truckee River. Now, OTR staff are working with OTR partners to raise funds to install a Portland Loo at: 1) John Champion Park, 2) Bicentennial Park, and 3) Mayberry Park.

<u>Action Item 1.4.c)</u> Develop and implement a coordinated vegetation management plan along the river.

 A collaborative process, led by Nevada Land Trust (NLT) is underway to complete a coordinated vegetation management plan along the river, including planning for a pilot restoration project and leading an adult education program for homeowners to conduct River-Friendly Landscaping practices. Now, the process is developing a restoration "cookbook" to test and needs to identify partners' priorities for restoration work along the mainstream of the Truckee River.

In addition, during the OTR Partnership Council 1st quarter 2021 meeting, Goal 1 Group identified a need to explore building and planning source water messaging to more than 100 public water sources that are not TMWA.

A Thriving River Environment - Goal 2: Create and sustain a safe, beautiful and accessible river connecting people and places.

Action Item 2.1.e) Enhance Truckee River visitor safety, access, public facilities (bathrooms) and education.

- Truckee River Month continues to be held during May and includes over 100+ community events conducted to inspire more to enjoy and care for the Truckee River.
- Keep Truckee Meadows Beautiful, Truckee Meadows Park Foundation, and Sierra Nevada Journeys continue to lead youth education, and adult education is led by Urban Ecology Solutions through OTR's River Friendly-Landscaping.
- OTR staff continue to build relationships with RTC and Truckee Meadows Trails efforts.

Action Item 2.2.b) Complete a multi-jurisdictional signage plan including standards for maps, directions, rules, stewardship and interpretive signs.

• Led by NLT, a multi-jurisdictional signage plan was completed and 250+ signs have been installed, including maps, directions, rules, stewardship, and interpretive signs along the river. Funding is needed for sign installations that are technically challenging such as over bridges.

Action Item 2.6.a) Expand the continuum of housing options, including a permanent overflow shelter, transitional housing, and access to permanent, supportive housing, including the wrap-around services needed to support residents.

 OTR's Human Service Educator is finalizing three project profiles to support this Action Item for OTR human service agencies to review and provide input in the Winter of 2021 and for the OTR Partnership Council to review, discuss, and build consensus on in 2022.

In addition, Goal 2 Group is dividing into two groups within the OTR Partnership Council; one related to recreation and the other human service related to homelessness along the Truckee River.

Public Education and Engagement - Goal 3: Build an aware and engaged community that protects and cares for the river.

No prioritized action items were developed at the end of 2017. Goal 3 Group identified completing a heat map of environmental youth education as a priority.

Long-term Management - Goal 4: Ensure the measurable, sustainable and collaborative management of the river for today and into the future

Action Item 4.1.a) Assess existing groups and structures for possible entities to house the management of the OTR Plan and develop recommendations.

• Completed. OTR transitioned from its fiscal agent, NLT to it's long-term home Truckee River Foundation.

Action Item 4.2.b) Create metrics for measuring success and achievements of the plan.

 OTR - Truckee Meadows Tomorrow - NV Tomorrow Dashboard created to measure the success and achievements of implementing the OTR Management Plan. In Fall 2021, Goal group meetings were arranged to review and provide final input on dashboard development.

In addition, the Goal 4 Group identified consensus to explore prioritizing the following:

- Action Item 4.1.b) Identify the statutory or code changes needed to strengthen OTR.
- Action Item 4.2.a) Develop a communication and marketing plan. This effort is underway.







Truckee River Restroom Project




Truckee River in Town of Truckee
